Grade 6 Summer Reading Assignments

1, You're Invited!

After reading your <u>choice</u> book, create an invitation for a party based on the book. You'll need to decide what type of party this is and who will be the host. You'll also want to include the location, time, and date of the party as well as what food will be served and who will be invited. Directions: Please answer the following questions in paragraph form.

- What is the party celebrating? Pick an event from the book that is celebrated or that could be celebrated.
- Who is hosting the party? Name the character from the story that is hosting the party. Explain why that character is the one hosting the party.
- Where is the party? Name and describe the location or the setting of the party and why the party would be there.
- What foods will be served? List the food that will be served at the party and explain how it relates to the story.
- Write any details from the book pertaining to the party: Why did you choose this type of party? What other characters will attend the party? List any other details that relate to the party.

Finally. create a party invitation.

Creativity is important! Your invitation may be hand-drawn and written, or you may type your answers and computer graphics. Your artwork must relate to your story and party and include the information a guest would need (for example: the occasion, time, place, etc.).

2. <u>For the required book</u>, you must be prepared to collaboratively discuss the book. Notes will help with this and there may be an assessment the first week of school. We will be using this novel to enhance our first unit in ELA. Please bring notes and the book to school on the first day.
