# **GRADE 7 SUMMER READING ASSIGNMENT**

- Create an IMOVIE for the book of your choosing: Create a 3–5 minute iMovie about one of the books you read over the summer, either the required texts or one of your choosing from the list. The iMovie should include the following:
  - Includes a summary of the novel (plot highlights but no spoilers, so avoid discussing the ending)
  - Includes a recommendation/critique of the book, include reasons why others should or should not read the novel (with specific details about plot, characters, and/or theme)
    AND for whom it might be appropriate
  - Includes one of the following: a reenactment of a key scene or a book trailer to entice people to read the book.
  - Uses creativity in the presentation
- For your required reading book Be prepared to collaboratively discuss the book. Discussion will include details about character growth, plot, and theme. Notes from your reading are necessary so you can be a full participant. An assessment may follow. Also, for each of the 3 books you read over the summer, fill out the reading response forms on the following pages. They will be submitted via schoology at the beginning of the school year.
